Biden to skip Papua New Guinea, Australia trip: only to attend G7 summit in Japan

Washington, May 17: US President Joe Biden has cantralia and Papua New Guinea. However, Biden will attend the Group of Seven (G7) Summit scheduled to take place in

Hiroshima, Japan this week. "President Biden will return to the United States on Sunday following the completion of the G7 summit in order to be back for meetings with Congressional leaders to ensure that
Congress takes action by the deadline to avert default. The President spoke to Prime Minister Albanese earlier today to inform him that he will be postinform him that he will be post-poning his trip to Australia. He also invited the Prime Minister for an official state visit at a time to be agreed by the teams. The President's team engaged with the Prime Minister of Papua New Guinea's team to inform them as well," a statement by White House Press Secretary Karine Jean-Pierre, read.
"We look forward to finding

"We look forward to finding other ways to engage with Australia, the Quad, Papua New Guinea and the leaders of the Pacific Islands Forum in the coming year," the statement added Earlier, the White House indicated the cancellation of Indicated the cancellation of Biden's trip which was reported in US media. John Kirby, the White House national security spokesperson, said that Biden would depart for Japan on Wednesday as scheduled, but a subsequent stop in Australia is being re-evaluated

"We're working through, thinking through, the rest of the trip right now," Kirby said, as he noted Biden would meet India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi



Albanese at the G7 anyway in Hiroshima, Japan. "We're re-evaluating the rest of the trip right now. We will make proper notifications if there are notifications if there are changes made to the rest of the trip. Given where we are right now, it's also incredibly prudent and responsible for the President to take a look at the rest of the trip and evaluate whether it. the trip and evaluate whether it makes sense going forward,"

makes sense going forward, said Kirby.
"We'll see where it goes...We are going to reevaluate the rest of the week after the G7, and we'll see where it goes. If the trip gets truncated or changed or modified in any way, it should be nothing more than it should be nothing more than a statement of the President putting his priorities where he putting his priorities where he believes they need to be," said Kirby, Kirby stressed that Biden would be meeting with Japa-nese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida at the G-7 Summit in Hiroshima. He will also engage with the prime ministers of India -- Narendra Modi -- and

Australia -- Anthony Albanese -- while he is at the economic gathering, Kirby said. "We're reevaluating the rest

of the trip right now," Kirby added. Biden was to attend a added. Biden was to attend a three-day summit of G7 leaders starting on Friday. Afterwards, he was to make a brief, historic stop in Papua New Guinea, then travel to Australia for a meeting of Japan, Australia, India, and the US grouping known as the Quad coun grouping known as the Quad coun-tries. He was also scheduled to at-tend a summit in Sydney along-side the leaders of India, Japan and Australia, collectively known as the Quad.

The development comes amid the United States government's debt ceiling crisis which has not been resolved which has not been resolved yet. Republican and Democratic lawmakers have failed to reach an agreement to lift the USD 31.4 trillion debt ceiling, as ne-gotiations continue. Treasury has cautioned the government an outcome that could have dire

consequences for the economy, if no deal is made. The negotiations on raising the nation's borrowing limit in order to avert a historic default is yet

The effects of an American default would reverberate throughout an already unsteady global economy. The White House had made clear that defaulting on US obligations would have damaging effects that stretch well beyond economic concerns. "That would containly from a patient contain." certainly, from a national secu-rity perspective, have a detri-mental effect," said Kirby ear-lier on a potential US default. "Certainly in terms of our repu tation and standing around the world, it sends a horrible mes sage to nations like Russia and China who would love nothing sage to nations like Russia and China who would love nothing more than to be able to point at this and say: 'See? The United States is not a reliable partner, the United States is not a stable leader of peace and security around the world," he added.

New York, May 17: New York-based non-governmental Watch (HRW) on Monday said Afghanistan remains one of the world's worst humanitarian disasters, according to Khaama Press. Pakistan looking towards friendly countries for funding following delay in revival of IMF bailout program

Islamabad, May 17: Paki-stan is now looking towards friendly countries for funding following a delay in the revival of USD 6.5 billion International Monetary Fund (IMF) bailout program, Pakistan-based ARY News reported. The staff-level News reported. The staff-level agreement between IMF and Pakistan is being delayed from February 9. The current loan programme with the IMF will end on June 30, 2023, and Pakistan is actually kistan is now 'considering' a new IMF programme on renewed conditions.

The fund is delaying the ninth review with Islamabad which has 'forced' Pakistan to get rid of the current loan programme and generate more funds from friendly countries, sources said, according to ARY News. As per sources, during the News. As per sources, during the tenure of Imran Khan's govern-ment, 'tough' demands of the IMF were also agreed upon for the loan programme. The incumbent government imposed taxes of Rs 170 billion through the money burdnet in Eabrupary as per the debudget in February as per the de mands agreed upon by Imran's government. Prices of gas and government. Prices of gas and electricity were increased up to 40pc and the rupee further depreciated as the IMF was assured to bring the dollar exchange rate as per open market.

ing pressure on the Taliban to end its appalling human rights

As per Khaama Press, since the Taliban took control of the country in August 2021, the amount of international aid has abruptly lost on one side, and the introduction of repressive policies, including banning policies, including banning women from working with the UN agencies by the de facto authorities, has worsened the situation. According to the UN, the engagement with the Taliban was proposed by the organization's special envoys in the Doha meeting without recognition of the regime until there is progress on human

Several Afghan human rights and civil society organi-zations have, however, criti-cized the UN and the international community for accepting the current repressive policies of the Taliban and rejecting all engagement with the group until mental rights were accepted.

Iranian pressure mounts on Hamas, Hezbollah for 'Joint Operational Mechanism' against Israel

Tel Aviv, May 17: In an Iranian bid to consolidate power against Israel, Tehran is placing heavy pressure on Hamas, Hezbollah and Palestinian Islamic Jihad to establish a "joint operational mechanism" based in Lebanon to coordinate military activities. mechanism" based in Lebanon to coordinate military activities. This development comes amidst the ongoing confrontation be-tween Israel and Islamic Jihad in the Gaza Strip and aims to unite Iranian proxies in the region. The aliance of Iranian-backed terror groups known as the "Jerusalem Axis is Iran's counterweight to the Abraham Accords. This axis finds support in Syria, Lebanon, Iran and Yeeme.

Reports from Arab and Lebanese sources indicate that Iran has been actively working towards establishing a shared opera-tional headquarters for Hezbollah, Hamas, and Islamic Jihad in tional headquarters for Hezbollah, Hamas, and Islamic Jihad in southern Lebanon. There are indications of plans to create a joint centre to coordinate rocket attacks on Israel. While the move seeks to strengthen the Jerusalem Axis's military capabilities, the Tazpit Press Service has learned that this is also creating internal divisions and tensions within its various terror groups.

Yanya Sinwar, the leader of Hamas in Gaza, has expressed

opposition to the initiative, preferring to maintain a more neutral stance. However, Saleh Arouri, an influential Hamas figure reportstance. However, Saleh Arouri, an influential Hamas figure report-edly based in Turkey supports closer ties with Iran and is leading the push for an "Iranian option." Hezbollah leader Hassan Nasrallah prefers to maintain his own "proxy" status rather than fully aligning with Hamas. As for Palestinian Islamic Jihad, Iran provides it with around \$100 million annually. However, Tehran gave PIJ freedom of action to pusue the Egyptian-brokered ceasefire which ended a five-day conflict with Israel. The heightened coordination between Iran and its proxies was evidenced by a series of meetings involving

and its proxies was evidenced by a series of meetings involving high-ranking officials earlier this year.

In one meeting of note, Esmail Qaani, the commander of the Quds Force of Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guards Corps, held discussions with Hamas leader Ismail Hanlyeh, Hamas deputy Saleh Arouri, and senior officials from Islamic Jihad and Hezbollah at the Iranian embassy in Lebanon. Shortly after Qaanis' visit, a barrage of rockets was fired into Israel from Lebanon on April 6, etches the secretary as expectation as expectation of the property of t strongly suggesting a coordinated effort.

Israel responded to the rocket attacks by targeting Hamas-affili-Israei responded to the rocket attacks by targeting Hamsa-staled sites in southern Lebanon. The following day, Hassan Nasarillah held a meeting with Hamiyeh, further suggesting Hezbollah's involvement and approval of the rocket fire. These events underscore the close coordination between Iran and its proxies, indicating Irans aspirations to establish greater coordination among the terror groups, including rocket attacks from Lebanese territory.

EIB agrees to Euro 350 million loan to IFAD to strengthen food security, reduce poverty

Rome, May 17: The Euro-pean Investment Bank (EIB) and the UN's International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) have penned two agree ments to further strengthen their cooperation in low- and middle income countries worldwide, with a particular focus on Africa. The agreements were signed in Rome by EIB Vice-president Ambroise Fayolle and IFAD President Alvaro Lario. The agreement signed today for a total of Euro 350 million is the second finance contract under second finance contract under the Framework agreement for the Euro 500 million package announced in November 2022. This EIB financing, in line with the EU's Global Gateway

strategy, will strengthen IFAD's response to help small-scale farmers adapt to climate change rarmers adapt to climate change and cope with the ongoing global food crisis linked to high food, fertiliser, and fuel prices. In addition to improving food security, the deal will strengthen small-scale farmers' resilience to climate change and preserve natural resources, safeguard ing the environment. The initial nche of Euro 150 million was

disbursed in March 2023.

The signature of the Procedural Framework agreement between the EIB and IFAD will further strengthen synergies by facilitating project implementation and procurement monitor tion and procurement monitor-ing for jointly financed public sector projects in shared coun-tries of operation. This proce-dural framework supports the growing trend of cooperation and mutual reliance, drawing upon praviusly established upon previously established frameworks with other Multilat eral Development Banks (MDBs) to provide clear, consis-tent, and resource-efficient pro-



The agreements fall within the EIB's strategy to increase its cooperation with clients, EU Member States, development finance institutions, civil society and many other partners under its EIB Global branch, launched last year and through which the Bank invested Euro 10.8 billion beyond the European Union in 2022.
